A forecast isn't a prediction – it can just be one way of thinking about what may happen in the future. Picking one of the provided forecasts as a starting point, think about how the library would position itself in that future. If it is easier to focus your thinking on a specific aspect of libraries - collections, partnerships, programs, services, spaces, technologies, etc and how those aspects would be positioned in the future, feel free to do so.
Forecasting & Backcasting Backcasting works from a possible (preferable) future that is set as a goal and dentifies the steps (planning) and changes (acting) necessary to make that future gostome to pass. Based on your work above, begin to backcast some of the intermediary steps that the library or the profession might need to undertake to make that future as
reality.
